Butte sits like a treasure in the heart of the Rocky Mountains, just waiting for you to discover its small-town delights encompassed by big-time outdoor adventure. Here, it's easy to find refreshment on the water complemented by dry activities that entertain, invigorate and enlighten.

### **ON WATER**

PADDLE Kayak or stand-up paddleboard on Georgetown Lake or the Clark Fork River, which begins its 360-mile journey here.

SPLASH Rush down a dynamic duo of slides or bask in the sun along Montana's longest lazy river at the new Ridge Waters water park.

**SOAK** Unwind in the indoor and outdoor pools and soaking tubs at Fairmont Hot Springs Resort.

### **ON LAND**

DISCOVER Walk, bike or take a trolley tour through the National Historic Landmark District and learn about the town's rich mining past.

SPARKLE See 1,000 gems, minerals, rocks, dinosaur fossils and meteorites at the Mineral Museum ... or search for your own crystals at Crystal Park.



Know Before You Go

Before arriving in Montana, check the status of the places you'd like to visit. It's good to have a backup plan if your destination is closed or busy.

TIP Arrive at parks early for reduced crowds.

Montana's history is filled with tales of new discoveries. Piece the state's story line together in lore-filled towns, through underground caverns and beneath the dome of the Montana State Capitol.

### **HISTORY LESSON**

Follow the route of early settlers on the 170-mile Vigilante Trail from Butte to West Yellowstone. Before you hit the road, descend into a former mine at The World Museum of Mining in Butte. Trade the road for the rails aboard the Alder Gulch Short Line Railroad between the gold boomtowns of Virginia City and Nevada City.

### **AWESOME EATS**

Stock up on hand-dipped chocolates and saltwater taffy pulled on-site at **The Sweet Palace**, an enchanting Victorian confectionery in Philipsburg. Get lost in the mesmerizing swirls of huckleberry vanilla fudge before savoring a bite.



### **WOW MOMENT**

The sandstone and granite Montana State Capitol in Helena provides a stately view with its copper dome. Hop on the Last Chance Tour Train to see the Capitol and other historical treasures in town.




### **PARK RANGER**

Lewis and Clark Caverns State Park is the coolest place to be on warmer days. Limestone caves chilled by "natural AC" showcase stunning stalactites, stalagmites and helictites.



### **WINTER BLAST**

The Old West echoes in 60-plus log-and-frame structures at **Bannack State**Park, the site of Montana's first big gold strike. Things got pretty rowdy here in the 1860s, but today you can ski right through town in blissful silence.

## 5 GEMS YOU'LL DIG

Hot springs, ghost towns, gem mines and mind-blowing landscapes fill the vast space between Montana's two national parks. Get a taste of the cool Southwest life at these five spots.

1 GATES OF THE MOUNTAINS Steep, 1,200-foot-tall limestone cliffs flanking the Missouri River create the illusion of a gate that seems to open as you travel

toward them. Enjoy narrated

boat tours during the summer.

- 2 VIRGINIA CITY One of the best-preserved glimpses into the gold rush era features 150 local and nearby National Historic Landmarks. Pan for gold, brave a ghost tour, and take stagecoach and train rides.
- 3 BLACKFOOT PATHWAYS: SCULPTURE IN THE WILD

This outdoor sculpture park near Lincoln showcases
14 large-scale works, each one celebrating the rich cultural, environmental and industrial heritage of the Blackfoot Valley.


4 GRANT-KOHRS RANCH NATIONAL HISTORIC SITE

Cowboys saddle up to check their herds at this working Deer Lodge ranch that commemorates the 19th-century cattle industry. Seasonal horse-drawn wagon rides provide a sweeping tour.

5 FAIRMONT HOT SPRINGS RESORT Soak up the fun in two Olympic-size swimming pools,

two mineral pools and on a 350-foot-long waterslide.
On-site dining, a golf course and a spa make this a year-round, weekend-worthy getaway.

MONTANA MATTERS
Practice Physical Distancing

Social distancing comes naturally in Missouri River Country, but if you do run into a herd of humanity, seek out different trails or other hidden gems. There are so many to choose from! In the northeast corner of the state, untamed wildlife and landscapes beckon nature-lovers of all kinds: bird oglers, stargazers, dinosaur hunters and sunbathers.



### **CREATURE FEATURE**

Flocks of migratory birds make pit stops in the Milk River at Bowdoin National Wildlife Refuge near Malta. Take a 15-mile, self-guided drive among freshwater wetlands and native prairie to spot ducks and geese, plus white-tailed deer and pronghorn antelope.



### **PARK RANGER**

Lean into the relaxing rhythm of sunny days and starry nights at **Brush Lake State Park**. During the day, chill on the beach before a dip in the crystal-clear water. After dusk, emerge from your tent for the brightest star show around.



### **HISTORY LESSON**

Need proof that the West was truly wild? See a former bar with a bullet hole and slug intact at Glasgow's Valley County Pioneer Museum, which is also home to a rare elk-hide tepee.



### **FUN FOR EVERYONE**

Spy rare fossils of delicate plants, ancient sea creatures and hulking dinosaurs—including the duck-billed Brachylophosaurus—at the Great Plains Dinosaur Museum and Field Station in Malta. Spaced-out displays and a single level of exhibits make wheelchair navigation easy.



### **WINTER BLAST**

Tread carefully onto the frozen surface of 383-square-mile
Fort Peck Reservoir for a shot at catching some of the 50 species of fish. Hell Creek
Marina north of Jordan can hook you up with the gear you need for a day on the ice.

# THE ULTIMATE PLAYGROUND

Exciting adventures await among the wide-open spaces of Missouri River Country. Reclaim your childlike sense of wonder as you explore and look to the stars.

### **UNEARTH COOL MUSEUMS**

The Montana Dinosaur Trail includes four stops in the region. See a life-size replica and skeleton cast of Peck's Rex, one of the most complete *T. rex* skeletons ever found, at Fort Peck Interpretive Center. Play with trains and other exhibits at the Children's Museum of Northeast Montana in Glasgow.

### **COUNT THE STARS**

Enjoy some of the darkest skies in the Lower 48 thanks to virtually zero light pollution. Great gazing spots include Hell Creek, The Pines Recreation Area, Brush Lake State Park, Seven Sisters Wildlife Management Area and the Little Rocky Mountains near Zortman.


### **FLOAT ON THE FORT**

Montana's largest body of water, Fort Peck Reservoir, boasts 1,600 miles of shoreline (more than the California coast). It's a paradise for boaters, water-skiers and anglers.

### **CATCH A BIG ONE**

Speaking of fishing, there are plenty of other hot spots to cast a line, such as Nelson Reservoir near Malta and the Missouri and Yellowstone rivers. Catch walleye, northern pike, salmon and more.

MONTANA MATTERS Leave No Trace

When recreating on public lands, stay on trails, take all trash with you when you leave and properly put out campfires. Campers should also use existing campsites or pick a site where vegetation is absent.

Go big and you'll never want to go home after visiting the heart of the state. Hike a sliver of a 1.5-million-acre wilderness complex and get your toes wet at one of the country's largest freshwater springs.

### **WOW MOMENT**

When you've got a friend like "The Bob," you'll never be bored. The Bob Marshall Wilderness Complex traces the Continental Divide for 60 miles, with elevations reaching 10,000 feet. Guides are highly recommended for multiday treks. Yet even if you only hike a mile or two of the easyaccess South Fork Sun River trail near Augusta, you'll get a sensory sampler of the region's skyscraper forests, lush meadows and rugged peaks.



### **HISTORY LESSON**

Once a dormitory for high school students during the rail boom of the early 1900s, The Calvert Hotel now offers luxe stays in Lewistown. Custom-tiled bathrooms and 50-inch smart TVs lend modern comforts in the geographic center of Montana.



### **FUN FOR EVERYONE**

Wheelchair-accessible seats and open captioning allow for inclusive video intros at the **Lewis and Clark Interpretive** Center in Great Falls. After learning about the duo's portage across the Missouri River's five great falls, follow accessible pathways to overviews of the river.



### **SPLASH ZONE**

Each day, Giant Springs produces enough water to fill 3.7-million standard bathtubs. After exploring one of the country's largest freshwater springs, enjoy a picnic among the silver poplars and blue spruce at Giant Springs State Park in Great Falls.






# **EVERYTHING** BUT THE ROAR

For almost 170 years, Montana has been a leader in bringing dinosaurs back to life.

Many scientifically significant dinosaur discoveries have come from right here, including North America's first identified dinosaur fossils. Today, the Montana Dinosaur Trail features 14 dinosaur facilities in 12 central and eastern Montana communities that share locally discovered dinos with visitors. Guided tours and behind-the-scenes looks at stops, including Glendive's Makoshika State Park, provide up-close and personal encounters with these creatures who lived 65–150 million years ago. Pick up a passport at any trail facility, get it stamped at all 14 stops and earn an official Montana Dinosaur Trail T-shirt.

There's more than enough room for everyone in the Big Sky State. On land considered sacred by the Indian Nations that reside here, roam responsibly and receive a warm welcome to this legendary realm of pristine waters and natural wonders.

### WOW MOMENT

For canyon grandness without the crowds, explore the expanses of Bighorn Canyon National Recreation Area. The views get especially dramatic from the water. Opt for pontoon rentals from Ok-A-Beh Marina near Fort Smith or free guided kayak tours available through the National Park Service.



### **SPLASH ZONE**

If you're looking for a catch you can really brag about, haul your tackle box to Tongue River Reservoir State Park, a rec-filled oasis on the prairie known for its record-breaking fish. Cast for crappie, walleye, bass and northern pike. The park also features 81 campsites, a small swimming beach, picnic areas and a marina store stocked with essentials.



### **PARK RANGER**

Rugged badlands holding dinosaur fossils make Glendive's **Makoshika State Park** a monstrous hit for families. Trails of varying difficulty beckon hikers and cyclists, and paleo experiences on summer Saturdays reveal the remains of *T. rex, Triceratops* and other once-roaring relics. Don't miss the park's visitors center filled with 74 million years' worth of eastern Montana history.



### **NATIVE CULTURE**

Every June, the Northern
Cheyenne tribe commemorates
the Battle of the Little Bighorn
during Cheyenne Victory Days.
Experience a powwow
highlighting cultural heritage
through elaborate regalia,
steady drumbeats and an
abundance of dancing.

# FRESH PERSPECTIVES

Look up, down and all around to discover the panoramic, paleological and human legends of the Southeast.

LIVING HISTORY When you experience Southeast Montana, you live its history. Learn about the Battle of the Little Bighorn on Indian Battle Tours, retrace the pioneer journey at the Range Riders Museum in Miles City, and see the only physical evidence that remains of Lewis and Clark's expedition at Pompeys Pillar National Monument east of Billings.

creature features Love dinosaurs? You're really gonna dig Glendive. Search for fossils at Baisch's Dinosaur Digs and meet "Margie" the Struthiomimus at the Frontier Gateway Museum. For your live animal fix, encounter Amur tigers, grizzly bears and more than 50 other species at ZooMontana in Billings.

### **NATURAL ATTRACTIONS**

Hop off the highways and onto the region's trails. Bike the rugged terrain of the Acton Recreation Area and hike to 360-degree views of the Yellowstone River Valley at Four Dances Natural Area. Cool off by boating on Bighorn Lake or paddling on Castle Rock Lake.



MONTANA MATTERS Pack Smart

Weather and terrain can change quickly around here. Pack layers of clothing to add or remove as weather changes. Also remember extra water, food and snacks, sunscreen, bug spray, and a first-aid kit.

Ancient glaciers leave a breathtaking legacy in a national park and on the state's largest body of water. Have the camera ready: You'll want to make sure these family adventures remain frozen in time.



### **SPLASH ZONE**

Just a few of the all-inclusive activities your crew will love at Flathead Lake Lodge in Bigfork: sailing, stand-up paddleboarding, kayaking, mountain biking, fly-fishing lessons and horseback riding.



### **WOW MOMENT**

Between Troy and Libby, the Kootenai River gains momentum, funneling its churning froth through a narrow gorge. Take an exhilarating walk across the Kootenai Falls Swinging Bridge suspended across the river.



### **WINTER BLAST**

Get snuggled up together for a sleigh ride at Bar W Guest Ranch in Whitefish. The soft rhythm of hooves hitting fresh powder makes for a calminducing ride along Spencer Lake and through the woods.



### **NATIVE CULTURE**

Tribal members of the Blackfeet Nation lead participants through the Badger-Two Medicine wilderness during enlightening Blackfeet Tours. Choose between single-day or overnight hiking and horseback adventures while learning creation stories.



### **AWESOME EATS**

On Saturdays from the first weekend in May to mid-October, Missoula boasts a trifecta of farmers markets, with a free trolley connecting all three. Keep an eye out for plump Flathead cherries in July and August and satisfyingly sweet huckleberries from August through September.



# GATEWAY TO WILD

Known as Nature's Favorite **Entrance to Yellowstone National** Park, Gardiner is home to wild water, diverse wildlife and seemingly infinite wilderness. Here are five cool facts to know before visiting the area.

- 1 Gardiner features one of the most diverse collections of large wildlife species in the country, including bison, bighorn sheep, elk, pronghorn, grizzly bears, black bears and wolves.
- 2 With 10 million acres of public land surrounding Gardiner, it would take a lifetime to hike it all. You'll find a trail here for every skill and ability level.
- 3 The Yellowstone River is the longest free-flowing river in the Lower 48. Gardiner offers Montana's first access to the river, which is known for its epic whitewater rafting and fly-fishing opportunities.
- 4 President Theodore Roosevelt himself laid the cornerstone to Gardiner's historic Roosevelt Arch in 1903.
- **5** Approximately 99 percent of Yellowstone National Park visitors never leave the road. Be part of the 1 percent that hits the Gardiner area's trails, horseback riding and ziplining tours, and other scenic excursions.



**MONTANA MATTERS** Play It Safe

One of the best parts about Montana is its amazing wildlife, but be sure to keep a safe distance. Always maintain a minimum of 25 yards (23 m) from all wildlife and 100 yards (91 m) from bears and wolves.

Animal attractions rule here, and they come in many forms. Let a horse guide you through majestic mountains, visit a town of lively prairie dogs and unleash the fun on a sled dog ride.



### **FUN FOR EVERYONE**

The black-tailed residents of Greycliff Prairie Dog Town State Park are adorable, but they also do serious work to create habitats for ferrets, mountain plovers and burrowing owls. See the little busybodies from the accessible parking lot.



### SPLASH ZONE

For a gentle rush of rafting thrills, head to the Yellowstone River. Montana Whitewater offers mellow Class II runs perfect for first-timers, plus combined rafting and zipline packages. Wild West Rafting features overnight river trips that include a grilled steak dinner and s'mores.



### **CREATURE FEATURE**

Saddle up in Red Lodge for a guided horseback ride with Elk River Outfitters. Two-hour experiences trot across the foothills while half- and full-day rides take you higher to showstopping views of seven mountain ranges.



### **AWESOME EATS**

Crowd-pleasing brunches are on the menu at Jam!, a vibrant diner in Bozeman. The corned beef hash has legions of fans, but the real reason to put your name on the waiting list is the pancake flight.



### **WINTER BLAST**

Who needs horsepower when you have dogs with perpetual cases of the zoomies? Dash through the snowy and scene-stealing Moonlight Basin with Spirit of the North Sled Dog Adventures in Big Sky.

# LET'S PLAY HOT AND COLD

The region surrounding America's first national park offers a plethora of wonderful ways to chill, thrill, warm up and relax.

### **WHAT'S HOT**

**THE SPRINGS** Yellowstone Country contains three hot springs: Bozeman, Yellowstone and Chico. At Chico Hot Springs in Pray, geothermal energy has kept the pools toasty for 100-plus years. After a good soak, glamp in on-site Conestoga wagons for an elevated Old West getaway.

**THE FISHING** With nearly 1,000 miles of shoreline, 61 state fishing access sites, nine blueribbon trout streams, and limitless spring creeks and lakes, this pocket of Montana is an angler's dream.

### **WHAT'S COOL**

THE VIEWS Roll down the window for crisp mountain air along the Beartooth Highway from Red Lodge to Cooke City. The seasonal route features mesmerizing switchbacks. Get a ground view of peaks by mountain biking beginnerfriendly trails in Paradise Valley.


THE POWDER More than 400 inches of snow falls on the region each year. World-class winter rec includes snowmobiling, skiing, ice climbing, dog sledding and more, all among captivating mountain towns.

Plan Ahead

Some areas of Indian Reservations may be open to residents or members of the tribe only. Plan to research any specific requirements in advance by visiting websites of tribal governments or calling ahead.

Make your Montana visit memorable by experiencing the varied languages, cultures and histories of tribal nations in Montana. Ancient traditions carried on today enrich the state's cultural landscape.



### PARK RANGER

In Billings, a journey through the Rimrocks (river-carved cliffs) leads to awesome overlooks of Four Dances Recreation Area and to Pictograph Cave State Park, where faded pictographs hint at the stories of humans who inhabited Pictograph Cave and other neighboring caves 2,000 years ago.



### **WOW MOMENT**

For hunting purposes, Native Americans stampeded buffalo off cliffs for hundreds of years, resulting in today's buried pile of compacted remains at First Peoples Buffalo Jump State Park near Ulm. Stand at a ledge for incredible panoramas of the Missouri River valley, and learn more about the role buffalo played in residents' lives at the visitors center.



### HISTORY LESSON

Hear somber stories and gain new perspectives during cell phone audio tours of Little Bighorn Battlefield National Monument. For a more personal experience, Crow tribes from Apsaalooke Tours lead one-hour journeys, offering their view on the battle and the events that led to it.



### **NATIVE CULTURE**

The relatively small but mighty Little Shell Tribe of Chippewa Indians didn't receive federal recognition until 2019, but many of its 6,000-plus enrolled members have enriched Great Falls for centuries. Get acquainted at the eye-opening Little Shell Cultural Center. (Call ahead for hours.)

## A DAY TO ROAM

Before traversing the unspoiled and unbeatable outdoor spaces of northeast Montana, choose one of two towns to be your home base.

GLASGOW Researchers at Oxford
University claim Glasgow represents the
middle of nowhere better than any other
town. Here, that's considered a plus.
Enjoy small-town hospitality at shops
and cafes while remaining close to daytrip destinations such as Fort Peck.

SIDNEY Montana's Sunrise City conveniently sits near the Yellowstone River and surrounding badlands. Dive into art, culture and history at area museums and historical sites; watch for wildlife on scenic drives around the region; and eat delicious local food for every meal.

## STELLAR NIGHTS

Follow a path showcasing primo spots for viewing the incredible night skies in the Big Sky State.

Eighty percent of Americans live in an area where they can't see the Milky Way due to light pollution from cities. In Montana, you'll see the galaxy in full glory—and perhaps even the Northern Lights—thanks to the state's high elevations, low humidity and wide-open spaces. Explore a star trail that includes two certified International Dark Sky Parks, dozens of jaw-dropping stargazing locations across public lands, and events and workshops where you can learn more about the cosmos.
